Last night, Hurricane Dante made **landfall** near the coast of Port Douglas. Many **residents** had already evacuated. The storm caused major flooding, and **essential services** have been wiped out in many areas. Dante's **impact** has **disrupted** the normal **routine** of just about everyone living in our community.

A major problem in Port Douglas is power **outages**. About half the city has no electricity and no idea when it will return.

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**Damage to Structures** Hurricane Dante has done millions of dollars' worth of damage to homes and other buildings. Some structures actually caved in from the force of winds unlike any Port Douglas **residents** have **experienced**, including the oldest among us.

Captain Marshall of the Port Douglas Police Department **surveyed** the damage from a helicopter. "I saw no fewer than 30 badly damaged homes near the riverbank," he **exclaimed**.

**Community Response** The community's **response** in the aftermath of Dante has been amazing. People have felt an overwhelming sense of concern and **support** for one another. Local **houses of worship** and schools have **provided** space for **food pantries** and **donations** of clothing. Neighbors have helped the **elderly** evacuate their homes. People who still have electricity have been **generous** to those without it. **Many have gone so far as to set up power-sharing stations, so that neighbors can charge their digital devices.** ✓

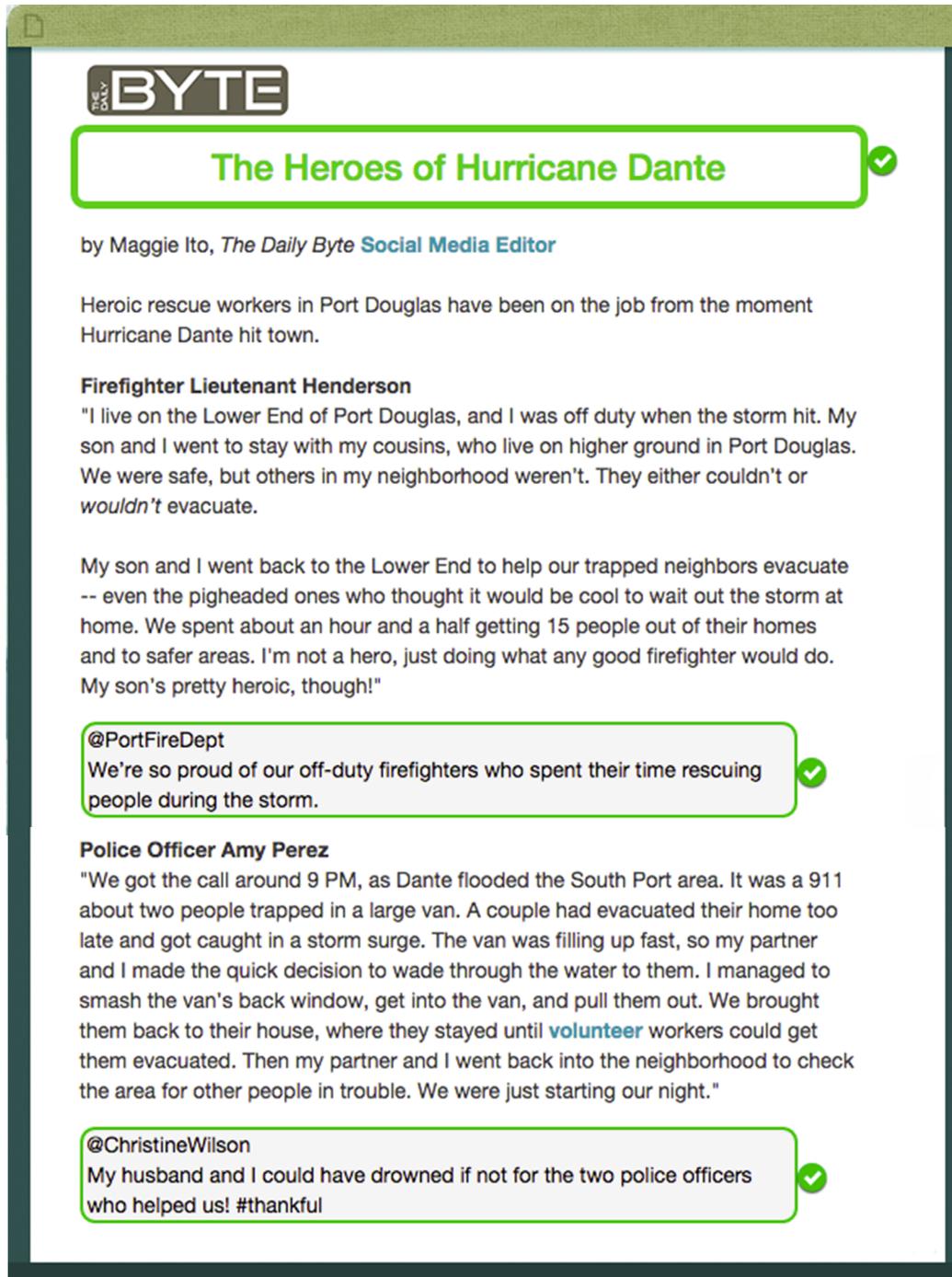

### The Heroes of Hurricane Dante

Heroic rescue workers in Port Douglas have been on the job from the moment Hurricane Dante hit town.

**Firefighter Lieutenant Henderson**

"I live on the Lower End of Port Douglas, and I was off duty when the storm hit. My son and I went to stay with my cousins, who live on higher ground in Port Douglas. We were safe, but others in my neighborhood weren't. They either couldn't or *wouldn't* evacuate.

My son and I went back to the Lower End to help our trapped neighbors evacuate -- even the pigheaded ones who thought it would be cool to wait out the storm at home. We spent about an hour and a half getting 15 people out of their homes and to safer areas. I'm not a hero, just doing what any good firefighter would do. My son's pretty heroic, though!"

"We got the call around 9 PM, as Dante flooded the South Port area. It was a 911 about two people trapped in a large van. A couple had evacuated their home too late and got caught in a storm surge. The van was filling up fast, so my partner and I made the quick decision to wade through the water to them. I managed to smash the van's back window, get into the van, and pull them out. We brought them back to their house, where they stayed until **volunteer** workers could get them evacuated. Then my partner and I went back into the neighborhood to check the area for other people in trouble. We were just starting our night."

### City Services -- What's Up and Running, What's Not

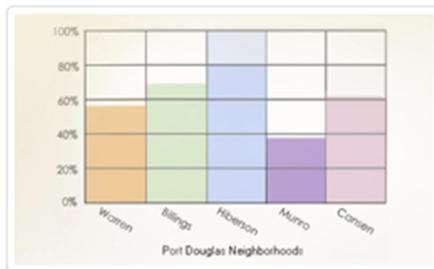
- **Who?** **Representatives** of **utility companies**, public transportation, and **social services agencies**
