

## **Martin Luther King, Jr. Lesson Plan**

This lesson plan accompanies the BrainPOP topic, Martin Luther King, Jr., and can be completed over several class periods.

Build Background	BrainPOP Resource: Movie
	Before Watching: Activate Prior Knowledge
	What makes an effective leader?
	<ul> <li>Describe a time when something someone said or did affected you?</li> </ul>
	Describe a time you felt you were treated differently for no reason. How did it feel?
	During Watching: Discussion Prompts
	Pause at the noted timecodes:
	Timecode 1:16: What were Jim Crow laws? What were the consequences of breaking these laws?
	<ul> <li>Timecode 2:53: What was the outcome of the Montgomery bus boycott?</li> </ul>
	Timecode <b>3:41</b> : What is King's dream in the "I Have a Dream Speech"?



## Think and Do: Cause and Effect

BrainPOP Resource: Make-a-Map

Students create a concept map identifying three actions or events and the effect of each on people's lives.

## Creative Assessment

BrainPOP Resources: Make-a-Movie; Creative Coding

- ★ Make a Concept Map: The Civil Rights movement has made huge strides toward equality, but has MLK's dream been "realized"? Make a concept map identifying examples of progress as well as ways we still need to improve.
- ★ Make-a-Movie: Produce a movie highlighting ways MLK Jr. led this country toward equality *and* the work still left to do.



	★ MLK, Jr. Museum: Code a museum exhibit with artifacts that demonstrate how Martin Luther King, Jr. changed people's lives.
Wrap Up and Synthesize	<ul> <li>Display the Anchor Question. As students present their projects, synthesize how each connects to, or answers, the Anchor Question.</li> </ul>
	<ul> <li>If time allows for break out groups, have students discuss on their own how their projects connect to the Anchor Question.</li> </ul>
